COME, GET FAMILIAR WITH THE MARSH and its great bird watching spots, so you can do some birding on your own time. On Saturday, March 29, 2014, 8:00 a.m. to noon, the Greater Mohican Audubon Society will have binoculars and scopes set up at **Funk Bottoms**, **Wright Marsh**, **Shreve Lake** and the **Bald Eagle Observation Area** to help you spot birds. Also, from 8:00 a.m. to noon, Dick Stoffer, Professor of Biology at Ashland University, will meet you at the boardwalk of **Brown's Bog** for short, guided hikes to identify the plants native to the bog and explain how and why the bog exists.
